

Worship Theme for Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany: "Words for the Beginning"

Advent is a season of endings and beginnings. As the calendar year comes to a close, a new church year rushes in. Christ's birth ushers us into new ways of living and loving — and yet, we feel the weight of many things coming to an end. What are the words that we will carry, and will carry us, that we bring

from the ending of one season into the next? In a world full of endings, how do we continue to hold out the promise of hope to a weary world?

As we move through new personal and political chapters, may these words for the beginning renew us and remind us of the ways we are called to live out our faith. No matter what you are facing, no matter what this new day brings, let love be your beginning.

December 1: The First Sunday in Advent – You Are a Blessing

Focus text: Luke 1:26-38



Mary is described as "blessed among women" (Luke 1:28). She is neither wealthy nor powerful, and yet she is chosen to bear God's child. Her story begins with blessedness, and so does ours, for the prophet Isaiah declares that we are claimed by a God who calls our name. We are a blessing because we belong to God. When blessedness is our beginning, we begin to see the world — and others — through the eyes of a God who says: "You are precious in my sight" (Isaiah 43:4).

This quilt square is a simplified abstract image of the angel Gabriel.

December 8: The Second Sunday in Advent – We Can't Go Alone

Focus text: Luke 1:39-45



Mary hears the words of the angel and agrees to be God's partner in bringing Jesus into the world. But she turns immediately from her angelic encounter to her earthly community, traveling to visit her cousin Elizabeth, who is also expecting a baby. Together they support each other and celebrate with each other, caring for each other in the long weeks of preparation and giving each other strength for the journey ahead. When God calls us to work for new life and new hope, God also calls us into community

with each other. We are not alone, and we do not have to journey by ourselves. God brings unlikely people together, and forms us into a covenant community.

This quilt square is called a "log cabin", and is meant to symbolize that together we can hold one another up and make something greater.

December 15: The Third Sunday in Advent — Hope is Worth the Risk!

Focus text: Luke 1:46-55



Hope is vulnerable and can feel like a tremendous risk, especially if you've experienced loss or trauma. But Mary shows us a resilient hope that takes risks — she risks her body to bear a son who will become the hope of her people. Through the ages, people have chosen to hope for a transformed world, and to act in ways that can bring about change. It can feel safer and easier to be a cynic, but the world doesn't need more cynics. It needs people who say, "It can be better" and make it so.

This traditional quilt square design is called "birds in the air". Sometimes when we take a risk, hope takes flight. At times it may feel like you're falling, but you'll find that, in God's embrace, you are flying.

December 22: The Fourth Sunday in Advent — Don't Forget to Share the Joy!



The birth of Christ brings good news of great joy to all people, which is cause for celebration. On this Sunday before Christmas, we invite everyone to share the joy by participating with us in our "Come as You Are Christmas Pageant". You get to choose which role you want to play in the pageant, and simple costumes and props will be supplied (it will be okay if we have lots of Marys or only a couple of shepherds). Narrators will invite the players to come forward when it's time. We'll sing lots of

carols, and have a joyful, informal service of celebration as we tell again the great good news of God-With-Us!

From a center point, tulip-like flowers stretch and bloom, referencing the Ralph Waldo Emerson quote, "The Earth laughs in flowers."

December 24: Christmas Eve — Love Knows Your Name Candlelight Communion service, 4:00pm



Christ's birth makes the vastness of God personal. The God who made the seas and the stars is also the God who made your beautiful hair and striking eyes. The God of creation takes on flesh, which means you are fully known. When the angels visit the shepherds in the fields, their message is global but also personal: "To you ... a savior is born." This birth is good news for everyone, especially those who are ignored or disenfranchised. On this night, God is born, and this God of love knows your name.

The love of God is represented by a heart with three triangles that seem to fold inward, ready for embrace.

December 29: The Sunday after Christmas - Blessed to Be a Blessing

Focus text: Luke 2:21–40

Mary and Joseph celebrate the birth of Jesus first by giving him his name in their community — inviting everyone to share the joy in a formal ceremony. Then they take the baby on a pilgrimage to Jerusalem, to introduce him at the Temple. There he is enrolled in the temple, and given a blessing by two elders — Simeon, a devout man, and Anna, called a prophet. They welcome Jesus and bless him for service to God and to the community. We remember the blessing that children bring lmage: to our community, and we ask God to bless them with strength and wisdom and holy favor as they grow in our midst.

January 5: Epiphany Sunday — The Road Isn't Straight

Focus text: Matthew 2:1-12



Too often, we've been told that a successful life is a linear one. But in reality, our lives unfold with many unexpected twists and turns. The Magi follow a star, embarking on a long journey in a foreign land in order to honor the newborn Christ. Instead of returning to Herod as commanded, they trust their dreams and go home by another way. Their road isn't straight, but God "makes a way in the wilderness" (Isaiah 43:19) as they follow their intuition and diverge from the expected path.

The triangles in this quilt square point in multiple directions. Much like the magi's journey, the path that lies ahead isn't always clear or straight. Thankfully, we have the guidance of the Spirit to light our way.

January 12: John the Baptist — Do the Work That Is Yours to Do

Focus text: Luke 3:7-16



As John the Baptist is teaching about bearing good fruit, the crowds, tax collectors, and soldiers ask him, "What, then, should we do?" His answer to each group is slightly different, but ultimately the same: "Do the good that is yours to do." We can each bear good fruit through acts of justice and righteousness. We can all be what Isaiah calls "repairers of the breach" by satisfying the needs of the afflicted.

We are each uniquely gifted, called, and equipped for the work that is ours to do in the world. In the center is the cross, symbolizing Christ's impact, and surrounding it are individuals reaching out and shining their particular light in the world.

Pastors' Ponderings



For those of us who gather in Advent expectation, we know that the only perfect gift ever given was the one we received in Jesus Christ. Finding that perfect gift is hard, often laborious work. Many of us seriously worry that our loved one won't like the gift, or they might find the gift to be unsatisfactory — so much worry leading up to Christmas. Yet, our congregation knows that our collective gifts through the Christmas Joy Offering celebrate the coming of Jesus Christ, the "perfect gift" from a gracious God. Indeed, there is only one perfect gift.

Think back on those people in your life who have truly developed your faith. It may be a pastor or Christian educator, a youth minister or Sunday school teacher. Devoted and caring leaders have led many of us in the way of Christ. Church workers have shaped our faith, and they have been God's gifts among us. As we celebrate Christ's coming and think of the profound impact these individuals have had on us, the Christmas Joy Offering provides a way for us to offer a gift in response, especially for those church workers who find themselves in times where they need assistance to pay bills or receive life-saving medical treatment. Our gifts



through the Christmas Joy Offering support these people who give so much of themselves to Christ's church.

Even as we support our current and former church leaders and their families, God is calling new leaders for our Church and world, through the ministry of Presbyterian-related schools and colleges equipping communities of color — including Menaul School in Albuquerque, New Mexico; Presbyterian Pan-American School in Kingsville, Texas; and Stillman College, a Historically Black College in Tuscaloosa, Alabama. Schools like these are sustained through the generosity of Presbyterians, which means a brighter future and enhanced opportunities for those students to use their talents and skills to serve God, the Church and the world for years to come. When you give to the Christmas Joy Offering, you help sustain these promises and uplift our siblings in Christ by reducing their burdens and opening new paths of opportunity.



Despite the worry and consternation of this busy season, we can never match God's perfect gift in Jesus, but through the Christmas Joy Offering, we can testify to who we have known God to be. Our perfect gift comes from above. Our gifts reflect our generous God. Our gifts support leaders in our Church and world — past, present and future.




Join Us for Worship — in person, online, or over the phone

We worship together on Sundays at 10:00am, both in person in the sanctuary and online. The service is livestreamed on our public YouTube Channel upcbgm.org/youtube, our Zoom room upcbgm.org/zoom/youTube, and is also accessible on YouTube any time. Those who can't access the worship videos online can call in on the phone to listen live on Sunday mornings, using the Zoom information listed below. So if you are not ready or able to come "in person", you are welcome to participate as you are able.

Everyone is invited to join us as we pray, hear God's word read and proclaimed, share our joys and concerns, and experience worshipful music.

If you're joining us in person, here's what you need to know:

- Air filtration units are deployed throughout the sanctuary to enhance your safety. If you have any symptoms of a potentially contagious illness, we ask that you put on a mask to protect those in our congregation who have compromised immune systems.
- Printed worship guides are placed by each door for you to pick up on the way in, and the hymns are printed in the worship guide.
- Offering plates are placed by the doors of the sanctuary, but we do not pass them during the offertory.





If you're worshiping with us online, all of the hymn music and prayer words are shown on the screen, and live captioning is used for other parts of the service such as the sermon and the Prayers of the People. If you watch on a small screen and need the printed version of the worship guide, it is available for download from our website upcbgm.org each week, or it can be mailed to you upon request if downloading & printing is not an option.

Sunday school materials are mailed to our families once a month to do together at home.



There is also a nursery space at the end of the hall at the front of the sanctuary that is open for use with a parent or guardian. It has a changing table, a rocking chair, and some toys appropriate for children ages two and under. There is a speaker in the room so you can listen to the service. Session Highlights

While the last newsletter described a number of activities that Session is involved in, the list this time is significantly shorter. That doesn't mean Session hasn't been busy!

The primary focus of Session the past couple of months has been finances — specifically, developing the 2025 budget for UPC (we're almost there!). The costs of operating our facility and the programs we're involved in approaches \$1,000,000 a year! A sampling of costs includes facility operations (building maintenance and repair, utilities, personnel costs), our programming (worship and music, personnel costs), and our internal and external mission programs (Community Meal and Pantry, the Card Committee). Our staff are dedicated to their work, but it couldn't all happen without the support of the congregation!

In the process of preparing the budget, Session reviewed the Personnel Committee's updated Position Descriptions — what used to be called the Office Manager is now titled the Office and Technology Coordinator. Compensation recommendations were incorporated into the budget.

The Annual Congregational meeting to discuss the budget and renew our covenant with our pastors will take place February 2, 2025, following morning worship. More information will be distributed in advance of the meeting, once the last few remaining budget numbers are finalized. Mark your calendars! Your participation is vital to the ongoing life of the congregation!

The Personnel Team has been busy this fall reviewing position descriptions for all jobs held by church staff. The years go by quickly, and some of the descriptions were indeed overdue for revision so that each one accurately reflects the positions at hand. For example, the COVID pandemic prompted the addition of several changes in job responsibilities based on how we manage the building, how we provide our community meal and food pantry services, the need to livestream our Sunday services, and the use of Zoom and other technologies. Changes in and additions to our music program also prompted some position description "refreshes", as did the establishment of the UP Center in our building. While still a work in progress, all position descriptions are on target to be completed for January 2025.

Annual check-in meetings with individual staff members were also completed this fall, providing an opportunity for feedback. Additionally, the Personnel Team provided input to the Session regarding budget recommendations for the coming year.

Get Involved! Community Meal & Pantry: Each Tuesday at 5pm, we offer a sit-down meal that is free for anybody, serving about 120 people a week. Volunteers are needed during the day on Monday and Tuesday to help with food preparation, and on Tuesday evening to serve the meal and clean up afterwards.

On Wednesdays from noon to 5pm, we run a free food pantry that also offers personal care & hygiene items when they're available. Volunteers help staff the pantry, and donations of non-perishable food and personal care items are always welcome.

Participants will complete short writing exercises and then share their work with the group, allowing the group members to provide feedback on the piece. This approach allows everyone the opportunity to express themselves in a safe, inclusive environment.

Connecting the Dots between the Waste Crisis and the Climate Crisis

Saturday, January 11, 11am

a Presbyterians for Earth Care webinar

Our own Elder Chris Burger will lead this program exploring how addressing the waste crisis helps in addressing the climate crisis. The program will also present implications for individuals and families.



Having worked in both the energy field as well as the field of recycling and zero waste, Chris is well-positioned to talk about the interconnections between the two. He established a Community Recycling Center in 1973. In 1977, he developed the first Weatherization program in the United States. In 1985, he developed our County-wide recycling program. He has co-founded and/or led a number of organizations focused on sustainability, including a Cornell University think-tank on sustainability (Eco-Justice Project) and the New York Sustainable Business Council. He is a member of Rotary International's Environmental Sustainability Rotary Action Group (ESRAG). He also walks the talk: he and his family have lived as a zero-waste household since 1992, and he designed and built a home that has been fossil-fuel-free since 1998. Known worldwide, he gives talks and workshops on both zero waste and how to wean ourselves off fossil fuels. Chris currently serves as Co-Stated Clerk for the Presbytery of Susquehanna Valley.


UPC's "Zoom room"

Presbytery News

News from the Presbytery of Susquehanna Valley

Our presbytery's newsletter, "Thursday Thoughts" (<u>susvalpresby.org/thursday-thoughts</u>), is published every week and includes announcements from our partner congregations in the region, news from the PC(USA) denomination, and links to webinars & resources available to us through the presbytery.

Thursday Thoughts often announces classes and retreats offered by churches, seminaries, and other agencies, some in person and others online.

We are all invited to expand our understanding of the church and its mission through a broad variety of topics. Check it out, you might find something that sparks your interest.

Our Presbytery works busily throughout the year to live out its mission to serve and encourage congregations as we together seek to be faithful in our calling to Jesus Christ. Here are some highlights of the ministry that is being done in the presbytery:

Rev. Dr. Greg Garis, our Lead Presbyter for Transformation, has introduced a new Presbytery Prayer Calendar (<u>susvalpresby.org/Prayer-Calendar</u>) which runs from December 1, 2024, to November 23, 2025 (the Liturgical year), cycling through each of the various congregations of the presbytery, as well as the committees of the presbytery and the staff of the presbytery, synod, and offices of the General Assembly. We're all encouraged to take some time each week to pray for our siblings in Christ.

The budget for 2025 was approved by the Presbytery Assembly in November, with expected expenses of \$378,499 next year. Nearly 30% of the budget will be funded by drawing on the Presbytery's reserve

funds, while 22% is funded through Per Capita assessments and 10% comes from a grant provided by the Synod of the Northeast to support the Lead Presbyter position.

The presbytery will welcome a special guest in April, the Rev. Tony Larson, Co-Moderator of the PC(USA) General Assembly. Rev. Larson will lead worship at the Presbytery Assembly meeting on April 12, location to be determined.

New officers were elected for the Presbytery for the 2025 calendar year: Moderator, Rev. Paul Huh (Walton); Vice-Moderator, Elder Dorothy Troike (Cortland); Cabinet Chair, Rev. Dave Johnson (Cortland). Many people were elected to serve on committees and commissions of the Presbytery, but there are still several open seats. They're looking for female Ruling Elders to serve on the Cabinet, the Commission on Ministry (COM), and the Commission on Christian Leadership Formation; male Ruling Elders for COM, the Committee on Representation, and the Committee on Nominations; and additional members to serve on the Permanent Judicial Commission. 

March 10-21, 2025, in New York City

Greetings from the Presbyterian Ministry at the United Nations!



The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), along with Presbyterian Women, will form a joint delegation to attend the UN's 69th Commission on the Status of Women to be held **March 10–21, 2025** (<u>unwomen.org</u>). Although it is only December, our office is already busy preparing for next year's Commission on the Status of Women which is held every March at the UN headquarters in New York City. The Commission on the Status of Women (CSW) is the principal global intergovernmental body exclusively dedicated to the promotion of gender equality and the empowerment of women.

We are proud to be a part of this community of over 5,000 participants from around the world, including UN Member States, UN programs, agencies, and civil society who come together to further gender equity. The main focus of the sixty-ninth session will be on the review and appraisal of the implementation of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action and the outcomes of the 23rd special session of the General Assembly.

The review will include an assessment of current challenges that affect the implementation of the Platform for Action and the achievement of gender equality and the empowerment of women and its contribution towards the full realization of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development (sdgs.un.org/2030agenda).

We are reaching out to you to nominate people from your presbyteries and synods to participate in CSW69. If you know anyone who would benefit from this learning and leadership opportunity, please have them fill out this application form before January 3rd, 2025: forms.gle/h1AeU8K8uMRRbwHg7. Due to high demand and limited spots, we recommend submitting the application before the deadline. Individuals selected as delegates should have some knowledge of or interest in the issues addressed by the 69th Session of the UN Commission on the Status of Women. In addition, efforts will be made to select a delegation that reflects the diversity of the PC(USA) including age, race, ethnicity, sexual orientation or gender identity, and geographical distribution.


"Have you heard our cries?": Korea Peace Journey

October 14-23, 2025

from the PC(USA) Presbyterian Peace Network for Korea

On this journey, people of faith will get to "hear the cries" of the Korean people, who have been divided and at war for over 70 years. Participants will learn about the barriers to peace that the United States and others have erected and maintained, and the efforts of peacemakers across the Pacific to overcome them.

Led by PC(USA) mission co-workers Kurt Esslinger and Unzu Lee, the journey will visit Seoul, the Demilitarized Zone, Jeju Island, and PyeongTaek. It will build connections between Christians in Korea who are working for peace and peace-loving Presbyterians and others in the U.S., enhancing the capability of all of us to promote peace on the Korean peninsula.



Participants and their counterparts in Korea will worship together, meet with persons impacted by past and continuing violence, and engage in discussion about how Christ might be drawing them and their faith communities together in action for peace.

Registration will begin March 1 and is limited to 25 people. Total cost: \$2,500 + airfare.

We renew the covenant between pastors and congregation every year by voting on their terms of call. "Terms of call" is the PC(USA) language for what, in the business community, is called a "compensation package". Recognizing that God's call to pastoral ministry is expressed in a three-way covenant between the presbytery, the congregation, and the pastor, each year you are asked to support the work of the pastors by agreeing to support them financially as well as through your prayers and participation. After the congregation votes, the terms will be sent to the presbytery for their approval.
