Get Involved! Without any doubt, the ministry of our congregation depends largely on the dedication and selfless contributions of volunteers — the incredible individuals who give generously of their time, energy, and unique talents. Here are some ways you can help us do Christ's work in our community:

Community Meal & Pantry: Each Tuesday at 5pm, we offer a sit-down meal that is free for anybody, serving about 100 people a week. Volunteers are needed during the day on Monday and Tuesday to help with food preparation, and on Tuesday evening to serve the meal and clean up afterwards. On Wednesdays from noon to 5pm, we run a free food pantry that also offers personal care & hygiene items when they're available. 
We are living in a gilded age of poverty amid plenty. In one of the wealthiest countries in the world, 40 million people live below the official poverty line and another 100 million people are one emergency away from economic ruin. But it doesn't have to be this way.

In You Only Get What You're Organized to Take, Rev. Dr. Liz Theoharis and her co-author, Noam Sandweiss-Back, argue it is possible to abolish poverty. But this won't happen through the goodwill of the powerful or the charitable actions of well-meaning people alone. It will happen through a mass movement, open to all, and led by the poor themselves.

Weaving together threads of history, theology, political analysis, and more, Theoharis traces her own journey through some of the most significant anti-poverty struggles of the past 30 years. Along the way, she and Sandweiss-Back introduce readers to the unsung heroes leading the movement to end poverty:

- Unhoused people seizing empty homes;
- Mothers on welfare going toe-to-toe with cutthroat politicians;
- Farmworkers taking down slavery rings;
- Backcountry clergy beating back the flames of Christian nationalism;
- Water protectors resisting the poisoning of their communities;
- and other modern-day prophets forging unlikely alliances to pray, sing, and organize their way toward freedom.

As the forces of extremism clamor with increasing fury, this book is an urgent reminder that poor people are not condemned to be subjects of history. Indeed, to reorient our society around the needs of all and reinvigorate the promise of democracy, the poor can and must become the architects of a new America.

Celebrate Earth Care with the United Presbyterian Church in East Guilford — Sunday, April 27 at 10am at East Guilford United PC Corner of NY Rte. 8 & County Hwy. 35, East Guilford, NY

The United Presbyterian Church in East Guilford is certified as an Earth Care Congregation from PC(USA) for the 14th year. It is just one of the 361 congregations in 41 states that chose to dedicate themselves to intentional care of God's earth this year.



One of the goals of the Earth Care program is to inspire churches to care for the earth in a holistic way, through integrating earth care into all aspects of their church life. Over the past 14 years the East Guilford Church has focused on diverse areas, such as installing energy-efficient bulbs, weatherizing the building, installing programmable thermostats, holding worship services outdoors, sharing produce from members' gardens, recycling household items with an annual rummage sale, planting trees, sponsoring solar power units for rural Ethiopia, and reducing paper usage. The annual Earth Care Sunday worship services highlight varied avenues for the protection and care for our earth with topics such as "going green", buying local food, the value of trees, farming traditions, plastic awareness, global warming.

The 2025 theme is "Our Power, Our Planet". The worship service on Sunday, April 27th at 10:00 will focus on renewable energy sources such as solar power. An additional



Sunday for Earth Care will be June 8th at the 10:00 service with guest speaker Chris Burger, who will do a presentation on garbage and ways households might reduce their garbage output. This service will be followed by a dish-to-pass meal with a question-and-answer period.
