



It comes fifty days after Easter, and most years it falls at the same time as the Jewish festival of Shavuot. In Judaism, the holiday celebrates the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai. In Christianity, it celebrates the gift of the Holy Spirit to the community of disciples.



God did not change the covenant relationship with the Jewish people but offered a new kind of covenant relationship to the rest of us, grounded in the knowledge of God's love as shown in Jesus, and guided by the Holy Spirit. We remember God's gracious love that invites us into a relationship with God, with the congregation, and with the world. WORDS OF INSTITUTION

We remember the witness of Jesus to challenge the empires of the world, to stop at nothing to declare God's love for all people.

We remember how the world responded to Jesus's ministry and teaching, by killing him. And we remember God's bold challenge to the world in bringing Jesus back to life. And because of all this, we dare to remember the night when Christ was betrayed.

Gathered at table with his closest followers, Jesus took bread, gave thanks, broke it, and gave it to the disciples, saying, "Take this. Eat this. It is my body, given for you. Do this — and remember me."

After supper he took a cup, gave thanks, and offered it also, saying, "This is the cup of a new and everlasting covenant, poured out willingly and lovingly. Drink this — and remember me."

And so we remember, and we reconnect with one another in this season, and as we invite Christ anew into our hearts, so we rededicate ourselves to proclaiming in word and deed Christ's realm. Amen!

We Tell and Hear the Word

FOCUS LESSON Acts 2:1-41, CEB

¹ When Pentecost Day arrived, they were all together in one place. ² Suddenly a sound from heaven like the howling of a fierce wind filled the entire house where they were sitting. ³ They saw what seemed to be individual flames of fire alighting on each one of them. ⁴ They were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages as the Spirit enabled them to speak.

⁵There were pious Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. ⁶When they heard this sound, a crowd gathered. They were mystified because everyone heard them speaking in their native languages. ⁷They were surprised and amazed, saying, "Look, aren't all the people who are speaking Galileans, every one of them? ⁸ How then can each of us hear them speaking in our native language? ⁹Parthians, Medes, and Elamites; as well as residents of Mesopotamia, Judea, and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, ¹⁰Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the regions of Libya bordering Cyrene; and visitors from Rome (both Jews and converts to Judaism), ¹¹Cretans and Arabs — we hear them declaring the mighty works of God in our own languages!" ¹²They were all surprised and bewildered. Some asked each other, "What does this mean?" ¹³Others jeered at them, saying, "They're full of new wine!"

¹⁴ Peter stood with the other eleven apostles. He raised his voice and declared, "Judeans and everyone living in Jerusalem! Know this! Listen carefully to my words!"

Summary of vv. 15–36: Peter's speech on Pentecost declares that the miraculous events witnessed are the fulfillment of prophecy, not drunkenness. He explains that God sent Jesus, proved his authority through miracles, and raised him from the dead after his crucifixion. Quoting King David, Peter shows that Jesus's resurrection was foretold. Jesus is now exalted at God's right hand and has sent the Holy Spirit. He concludes by proclaiming that Jesus, whom they crucified, has been made both Lord and Christ.

³⁷ When the crowd heard this, they were deeply troubled. They said to Peter and the other apostles, "Brothers, what should we do?"

³⁸ Peter replied, "Change your hearts and lives. Each of you must be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins. Then you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. ³⁹ This promise is for you, your children, and for all who are far away — as many as the Lord our God invites." ⁴⁰ With many other words he testified to them and encouraged them, saying, "Be saved from this perverse generation." ⁴¹ Those who accepted Peter's message were baptized. God brought about three thousand people into the community on that day.

Get Involved! Without any doubt, the ministry of our congregation depends largely on the dedication and selfless contributions of volunteers — the incredible individuals who give generously of their time, energy, and unique talents. Here are some ways you can help us do Christ's work in our community:

Community Meal & Pantry: Each Tuesday at 5pm, we offer a sit-down meal that is free for anybody, serving about 160 meals a week. Volunteers are needed during the day on Monday and Tuesday to help with food prep, and on Tuesday evening to serve the meal and clean up afterwards.

On Wednesdays from noon to 5pm, we run a free food pantry that also offers personal care & hygiene items when they're available. Volunteers help staff the pantry, and donations of non-perishable food and personal care items are always welcome.

Gathering at the Lord's Table — Our Communion Elements:

We are celebrating communion during today's worship service. Our communion bread is gluten-free, and our shared cup is cherry juice, so that all may partake of the same elements during our communion. Please speak to one of the technicians at the back of the sanctuary if this creates any difficulties for you.

Children in Worship: "Let the little children come to me..." —Matthew 19:14 We are glad that your children are here today, and we hope that you know that they are welcome and encouraged to be in worship with you. We truly believe that a community of faith is made up of people of ALL ages. There is a PrayGround space with coloring sheets and quiet toys in the front of the sanctuary to use there or can be taken to another pew, if that suits your family's needs. Sunday school materials are mailed to our families once a month to do together at home.

There is also a nursery space at the end of the hall at the front of the sanctuary that is open for use with a parent or guardian. It has a changing table, a rocking chair, and some toys appropriate for age two and under. There is a speaker in the room so you can listen to the service. Please let us know if you have questions.
